



# EMN Hungary National Conference "Different Regional Solutions to the Challenges of Temporary Protection"

### 1. RATIONALE AND AIMS

The EMN National Conference aims to inform and advance current policy dialogue on managing the evolution of temporary protection and related migration frameworks in the EU, especially in Central Europe with a practical focus on operational implementation, legal transitions to other statuses, and dignified return pathways. Bringing together EU and national policymakers, agencies, and expert organisations, the event seeks to connect high-level policy developments with on-the-ground practice for tangible results.

Specifically, the conference will:

- Provide food for thought through evidence-based perspectives on potential transition scenarios from the EU temporary protection regime, highlighting legal, operational, socio-economic, and fundamental rights considerations.
- Share good practices from Central and Eastern Europe, identifying replicable approaches, common bottlenecks, and opportunities for cross-border cooperation and procedural convergence.
- Encourage pragmatic solutions for policy and practice, including safeguards for protection continuity, support for sustainable integration or voluntary return, and cooperation modalities among Member States, EU agencies, and international partners.
- Foster networking among EMN NCPs, EU institutions, national authorities, and expert organisations to sustain follow-up, peer exchange, and potential pilot initiatives after the event.

Particular attention will be given to the challenges of ensuring protection continuity, sustainable integration, and voluntary return opportunities in line with international standards. 	The aim of this panel is to exchange knowledge and experiences on regional practices within Central Europe, focusing on both challenges and successful approaches in managing protection, migration transitions, and returns. The discussion will explore how different

national contexts address operational obstacles, foster cooperation among neighbouring countries, and implement innovative or effective solutions that could be replicated across the region. Special attention will be given to strengthening cross-border collaboration, harmonising procedures, and sharing lessons learned.

In this panel, experts from Central European countries will present their country-specific experiences, identify key pressure points, and share examples of good practices that have yielded measurable results. Practical recommendations emerging from these insights may inform broader regional or EU-level policy dialogue.
